Nick struggled through his childhood in Tuba City. His eventual diagnoses of Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder precipitated his referral to a children's group home in Phoenix where major bouts of depression set in. Lacking self-management skills, Nick was extremely destructive. When he aged out of the children's welfare system at age 18, he was referred to Intermountain's Vida Nueva Apartments serving seriously mentally ill adults where he would receive one-on-one staffing, 24/7. His self-harming activities nearly resulted in setting his Vida Nueva apartment on fire!

Seeking a more structured setting, he was referred to Intermountain's adult therapeutic foster care provider, Justin Finyom, for placement in his home. For months, Justin insisted that Nick try to complete his high school diploma at Palo Verde High School. For months, Nick had to be awakened by Justin each school day, had to be transported to school because he missed the school bus, destroyed his school ID card, and just didn't want to attend school, let alone graduate. Justin started building on Nick's love of drawing Navajo rug patterns in reinforcing his school attendance.

One day, Nick turned the corner and became the advocate for getting to Palo Verde on time. This

This summer Nick has enrolled in pottery classes and is looking forward to a transition to the semi-independent Kiva Apartments by the end of the summer...and enrollment in a job training program. In Intermountain's Adult Residential Program, Nick has become an affable gentleman, acquired a diploma, developed new arts expertise, adopted a positive lifestyle, acquired independent living skills and lots of admirers.

## Beto's Energy Turns His World Green

When Beto arrived at Victor Pondeca's therapeutic foster home almost six months ago, he was a force to be reckoned with...a bundle of overwhelming energy. He had aged out of the Children's Welfare System while living in an Intermountain foster home for children and was continuing to work on developing positive outlets for his temper and anxiety. When he became overwrought, he ran outside to throw rocks, kick rocks, kick trees, and take his frustration out on Mother Nature. The landscape at Victor's house became his Wailing Wall but he did develop a taste for cleaning up the yard...pulling weeds, raking, and sweeping when he was upset. So, just about the time Beto was graduating from high school in the spring, Victor planted an idea in Beto's treatment plan. He took him to Home Depot and Lowe's where they purchased seasonal vegetable seeds to start a very small garden in the backyard. With Victor's help, Beto prepared the garden plot, planted tomato, green bean, squash and watermelon seeds and devised a watering and pruning regimen. His reinforcer was the time and attention that he got from Victor when they did the daily watering together.

Through their watering conversations, Beto developed an interest in conserving water and the twosome began harvesting rain water and using grey water from the house on their vegetables. Beto decided to take a step further and enlisted Victor's help to use recycled materials to assist in irrigation. They are now harvesting so many vegetables that they are considering providing them to Intermountain's group homes. This fall, they plan to expand the garden to incorporate the side yards just as Beto begins culinary classes at Pima Community College. Having found a healthy outlet for his energy, Beto has stopped all of his aggressive behaviors towards Mother Nature and is looking for volunteer work in landscaping and animal husbandry. Now that's a success story!

## With A Little Help From Our Friends...In Oregon!

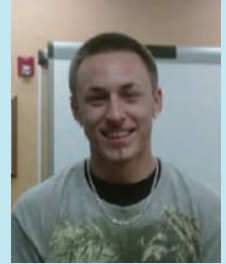

## Samuel Speaks

*From the Division of Behavioral Health Services Newsletter – Recovery WORKS*

"At the age of 14, I began using drugs and drinking regularly. I did anything I could to support my habit and



never cared about anyone, including myself. A pivotal moment came at the age of 17, when I blacked out and committed a crime that put me in jail for five months, cost another family their home, and forced my family to leave the community they had been in for 25 years. The judge gave me one chance to make a change and my future relied on it. I was court ordered to participate in substance abuse services and was referred to Intermountain Centers for Human Development's MOSAIC program. I met my "team," consisting of a case manager, a therapist, and an intensive in-home worker who encouraged me to believe in myself and keep a positive attitude. Most influential was my intensive in-home worker, who taught me skills to prevent relapse and provided a consistent, stable influence that I could trust and rely on.

Despite the destruction I had caused, my family stood by me and gave me the irreplaceable, unconditional love that I would need to be successful. Now I am back in high school working to get my diploma, am preparing to be the proud father of a beautiful baby boy and being an active member of my community. I continue to make great strides in righting the wrongs of my past and looking forward to becoming the healthy successful man my family raised me to be."

# Bahidaj Harvest Camp is Educational Adventure

Tohono O’odham children receiving In-Home Services from Intermountain participated in a Bahidaj (Saguaro Fruit) Harvest Camp this summer, based on the tradition of their Tohono O’odham people. During the harvest the fruit is removed from the saguaro with a huipaD, a pole made of a saguaro ribs lashed end on end with a crosspiece near the top, and distilled into syrup or jam. The harvest typically occurs in late June/early July, when the fruit ripens and begins to split open, and continues until the first big monsoon rain-storm comes and washes away all the fruit from the saguaros. The youth who participated became quite adept at removing fruit from the saguaro, thanks to excellent tutelage from Maria Francisco and colleagues.

## Irene Bjorklund Receives Silver Bear Award

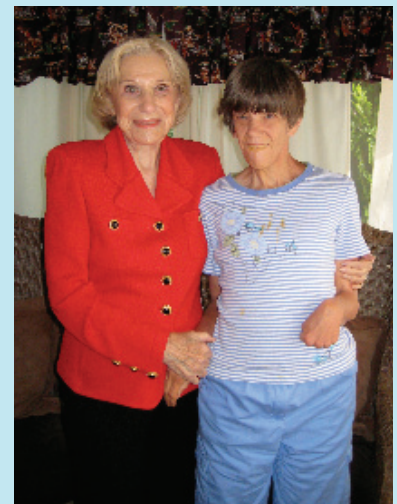
In 1978, Irene and Carl Bjorklund leased a beautiful piece of rural Chino Valley property to Intermountain’s new residential program for developmentally delayed Arizonans. The site, covered with large elm trees and shady settings for picnics and swings, was serene. The property featured a newly-constructed, large well-appointed home for a group residence (Chino Lodge,) a greenhouse, and several smaller buildings which would serve as an office and a Day Program location.

Clients who came to live at Chino Lodge and receive intensive residential support services thrived in the home-like environment. Each resident was treated to positive and productive community-based care. The program grew and flourished, thanks to Irene and Carl’s upgrades to the property and philanthropic support of Intermountain’s mission.

## Chris Overcomes Multiple Challenges with Help From In-Home Services

Chris, an outgoing and cheerful nearly-19 year old, resides in rural Sahuarita with his mother, grandmother, and dog. He was born with Cerebral Palsy, hearing loss, and a seizure disorder.



For most of his life, Chris attended the Arizona School for Deaf and Blind and would cycle in and out of a Tucson behavioral health hospital every 2 or 3 months, staying as long as a month. After a hospitalization two years ago, he was enrolled in Intermountain's In-Home Service Program in Green Valley/Sahuarita and a collaborative service plan brought him Bobby, a habilitation technician with the Arizona Department of Developmental Disabilities.

Through the collective work of his Child Family Team, Bobby, and his Intermountain staff, he has been able to live at home with his family while he addressed multiple medical, physical and behavioral needs since that time. Now Chris recognizes when a seizure is imminent and, fortunately, the seizures have reduced in duration and frequency. His aggressive behavior has diminished significantly as he has acquired and employs increased coping skills. His In-Home staff has helped him build a "Buddy Book" and an "Emotions Book" with photos of Chris and friends, to help him identify his feelings and appropriate responses to those feelings.

This spring, Chris transitioned from Arizona School for the Deaf and Blind to a local, mainstream school where he has an aide to support him with his modified curriculum. This summer, Chris is attending Jewish Community Center Camp for the third year, where he has friends and a job – he's a junior team leader! Chris has endeared himself to his staff and all of the supportive people he has met during the past two years. He is a true example of what can be achieved when agencies work together to provide Wraparound Services. With many successes under his belt, Chris and his mother look forward to planning for his longterm goal of increased independence in an assisted living setting. During his transition from "child" to "young man", Chris has made tremendous strides in stabilizing, learning and growing. Keep up the good work, Chris!

## Tucson Administrative Staff Volunteer a Day in the Trenches

On April 26, a dozen Intermountain administrative staff descended on Sunrise Ranch for a day of restoration, deep cleaning and redecoration. Steam cleaning and painting walls, degreasing the fireplace screen, oiling furniture, installing new upholstery, scrubbing bathroom and kitchen walls, wiping down the dining furniture and kitchen counters, mopping floors and dusting light fixtures, hanging new curtains and laying new rugs followed the rearranging of some newly donated furniture, including a big screen TV and linens. Competition arose amongst the staff members adopting bedrooms to see who could pass the "white glove" test! All of this industry was complimented by pizza for all! What an incredible day it was for all of us who support the Children's Residential Program but don't get to spend a lot of time in the homes. Sixty hours of labor was logged in a day. The residents swooned when they returned from school!

## Good News from the Therapeutic Day Program

During his early teen years, T.W. developed delinquent behaviors and gang affiliations that landed him in the Juvenile Justice system. At 17, the court ordered him placed out of Tucson, away from family and friends, in a Residential Treatment Center in Phoenix. He spent five months at Sycamore Canyon, hoping to be returned to his home. When the transition back to Tucson began, T. W. was referred to the Therapeutic Day Program for structured support three days a week. His goals identified, he began to learn how to interact safely in his home community and increase his positive community activities. Through the Program, he enhanced his job-seeking skills: increased his interviewing skills, expanded his knowledge of appropriate interview attire, and learned how to complete a job application. Using positive coping skills that he acquired in the Program, T. W. increased his ability to manage symptoms of his mood disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD.) Program staff practiced with him in self-transporting, riding anticipated bus routes for possible employment sites. Emerging as a leader in the Program, T. W. completed all of his identified therapeutic goals in only 64 days and obtained a job at Egee's. After nearly 90 days, he's still on a successful track. His mother is amazed. Intermountain's Day Program staff knew T. W. would succeed, when given positive transitional support in his home community.
