Chino Valley Program Dedicates New Facilities

Approximately 200 family members and friends of the Chino Valley "Los Trepadores" Program for Developmentally Disabled individuals celebrated the completion of a major renovation of the facility and grounds on Friday, July 29. Two spacious new buildings have been added, one for the Day Program and one for the Administrative Offices and Conference Rooms, and the grounds have been re-landscaped and upgraded with handicap accessible walkways, porches, and parking lots.

Their enthusiasm for the program proved that clients thrive in home-like environments where each resident is treated to positive and productive community-based care.

Tours of this beautiful rural compound where the group home Chino Lodge is also located, impressed all who attended. A delicious picnic lunch was enjoyed under the shade of the giant elm trees and guests were thrilled by the Hopi Corn Dances and Hopi Shield Dances performed by Intermountain Program Coordinator Manuel Humeyestewa's family. Marlene Rankin, the Director who heads this outstanding program, unveiled a commemorative plaque dedicated to the owner of the property, Carl Bjorklund, and his foreman, "Shorty" Eijnck.

Many of the 33 adults and children who are residents were present with their families. Their enthusiasm for the program proved that clients thrive in home-like environments where each resident is treated to positive and productive community-based care. To top it all off, Marlene and her staff hosted a Management Conference for 40 program and administrative staff from all of Intermountain's sites and shared many Chino Valley successes. We were all very impressed!

TEP Steps Forward with Many Helping Hands

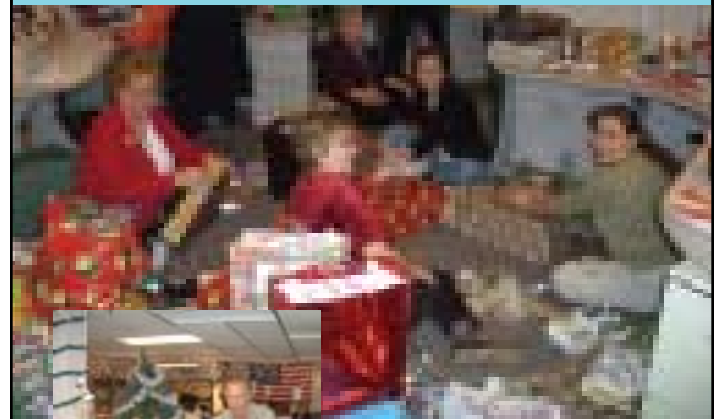
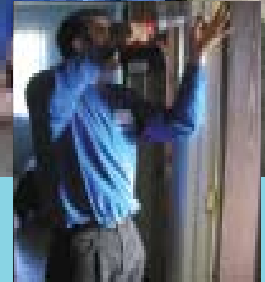
Little did we know when Intermountain received funding through Tucson Electric Power's Grants That Make A Difference in 2002 the wonders our association with their employees would bring! Not only did the grants program provide critical funds for basic needs for Seriously Emotionally Disabled children removed from the custody of their families, an alliance was formed that has been extremely rewarding for us all!

TEP's Community Action Team (CAT), under the direction of TEP's Community Relations staff Sharon Foltz and Anna M. Cuñes and the TEP CAT Steering Committee, has initiated an action plan to support hundreds of volunteer projects that are undertaken each year by their employees. During the 2004 Winter Holiday season, TEP CAT volunteers representing TEP's Customer Service Call Center, Map Room, Credit, Quality Mapping and other TEP departments, coordinated the fulfillment, collection and distribution of Christmas Wish Lists for all forty children living in Intermountain group residences.

The dedicated TEP CAT volunteers "adopted" each holiday "wished" gift item and purchased all that the children had "wished" for including a bicycle. Then, Call Center volunteers wrapped each gift with loving care and delivered them to Intermountain on December 23rd! The Fleet Services, Corporate Communications and Community Relations Departments adopted two families from the Home-based Family Preservation Program. On top of those amazing acts of kindness, the Corporate Accounting Department volunteered to refurbish Navajo House, visiting four times during this year to do landscaping projects, re-decorating and deep-cleaning the kitchen and bathrooms. They even donated a super computer for the kids to use! And to help our students get off to a good start this school year, TEP's Information Services Department initiated a "Back-to-School Backpacks Drive" that provided 14 Intermountain youth with new backpacks complete with school supplies and snacks.

Jenny Celebrates Fifth Birthday with Care Bears and

Just a few weeks prior to her fifth birthday, little Jenny was removed from her parents by Child Protective Services. She was removed due to severe neglect. The home was filthy with trash and debris scattered throughout. The only food to be found was not edible due to the fact that it contained massive amounts of bacteria and mold. It was also discovered that Jenny was kept locked in her room for extended periods of time; isolated from her mother and father. The only companion Jenny had was the television that was left in the room with her. Jennifer had no toileting skills and only spoke a few simple words. She also had a severe case of head lice. Jenny was initially placed in a regular foster home with five other children. The foster family requested her removal only after a few days due to her lack of socialization skills, dramatic behavioral outbursts, and continued head lice.

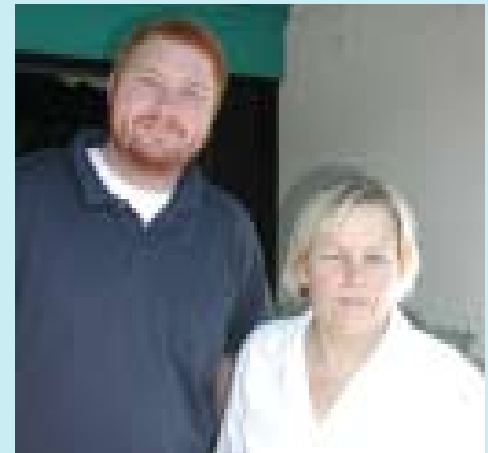

Home-Based Therapy in Three Points, AZ

Approximately forty children and their families are currently served through the collaboration of Community Partnership of Southern Arizona and Pantano Behavioral Health Services. Home-based services are provided by therapists from Intermountain Centers for Human Development and school-based services are provided by Portable Practical Educational Preparation, Inc. (PPEP). Using the Child/Family Team model, an Intermountain therapist provides services in the home in order to allow for greater sensitivity to the child/family and their individual behavioral health needs. The home-based therapist delivers these services twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week in order to address the intensive needs of the clients. Additional services include: support/advocacy at school, case management services, respite services and child/family teams that include parent aides. The children/families are additionally eligible for psychiatric care and medication services provided through Pantano Behavioral Health Services. Intermountain staff participates in the Community Substance Abuse Advisory Committee (CSAAC), which consists of behavioral health providers, clinic practitioners, public health staff, Altar Valley Middle School staff, and community advocates/residents. The coalition group met in July in order to develop an action plan that addresses communication needs for the Three Points residents. An identified goal is to hire a communication representative that would work with all providers to increase continuity of care and access to the underserved populations in Three Points.

Michelle Coffin, Program Director for Intermountain, has been working in the Three Points community for the past year. She graduated from Illinois School for Professional Psychology in Chicago, Illinois with a Masters in Counseling. She is a certified alcohol and drug abuse counselor and has worked in the field for over fifteen years. In addition, Intermountain has recently hired a second therapist, Matt Gjurjevich, to assist with delivering services in Three Points.

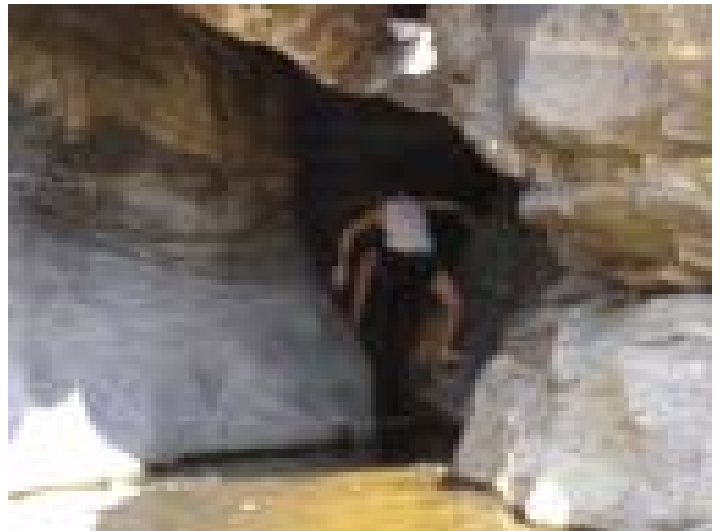

Direct-care staff members have the charge of discovering each individual's strengths and interests and immersing their clients in those activities, crowding out the opportunities to be involved in negative thought or actions. Recreation creates circumstances for the introduction of positive life skills. At Intermountain, recreation rules!

She brought with her an acute interest in her Navajo culture, a significant talent in weaving and an anger management problem that kept her from enjoying the wonders of her home community. At Vida Nueva, Juliet was placed in a two bedroom apartment with 24 hour staffing and a roommate. She immediately impressed the staff with her intense pride in her new home and the level of cleanliness and order that she maintained. Early on, Juliet identified her interest in going to college and the staff quickly got her enrolled in Adult Education courses at Pima Community College. In addition, she is beginning regular coursework in prerequisites for a degree by taking Math at Pima. Juliet enjoys many healthy pastimes; she loves to swim, play basketball, and work out at the gym. Acquiring new computer skills gives her a great deal of pride and pleasure. Juliet is off and running, building new vocational and leisure skills, and thanks Intermountain for helping her with her mental illness and anger management!
